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

In this class we will look at English syntax with comparison to other languages

- How are English sentences structured?
- How is this different from Chinese, Japanese etc.?

#### Example:

English

The cat is on the mat  $\square$ 

<u>Japanese</u>

Cat the mat on is <a>I</a>

猫はマットの上にいる

Chinese

Cat is mat on <a>Image</a>

貓咪在墊子上

Example:

English

The dog bit the man ✓

<u>Japanese</u>

Dog man bit ✓

犬は男性を噛んだ

Chinese

Dog bit man ✓

狗狗咬了一個男生





• How do small changes in word order affect meaning?

Example:

She only likes books 她只喜歡書 Only she likes books 只有她喜歡書

Sometimes we can play with word order to be poetic: Books, only she likes them.
Who likes books? Only her.





- This class will be taught in simple English so it is not for total beginners.
- But it might be too easy for advanced students!
- I will use some Chinese (but my Chinese is bad, so please don't expect too much)
